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Additional crews, advanced life support for emergency medical calls and ambulance transport with no out-of-pocket expenses for the patient are just a few benefits the residents of Edgewood and Milton would see with the merger.

Merger efforts progressing

Progress is being made towards a merger between Edgewood Fire (Pierce County Fire District No. 8) and East Pierce Fire & Rescue. The Edgewood Fire Commissioners will vote at their December 8 meeting on whether or not to ask for a public vote on the issue. If the commissioners decide on a public vote, the merger will be on the ballot on February 9, 2010.

the ballot on February 9, 2010. Edgewood Fire Chief Ed Goodlet views the merger as a viable option for addressing the increasing demands for fire and emergency medical services. "As our community needs increase, it is imperative we pursue opportunities to meet those needs." he said. "This merger will provide the best option to better serve this community."

Goodlet stated that the number of emergency calls has jumped by 82 percent from 2003 to 2008. The majority of the increase is in 9-1-1 calls for emergency medical services. According to the fire department, medical calls in 2003 totaled 401. In 2008, they had more than doubled to 811.

Edgewood Fire provides basic emergency medical aid, but relies on private ambulance services and mutual aid from neighboring fire departments for more serious advanced medical aid and transport to hospitals. "We cannot continue to rely on our neighbors for aid," Goodlet said. "The merger would mean we would have a full-time medic unit staffed with firefighter/paramedics who can respond

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Plan now to make this a safe winter season

inter is a wonderful time of year, but it can also bring safety challenges. Your

firefighters have a few tips to help make this a safe season: * Keep Christmas trees, decorations and wrapping paper away from heating sources. And don't forget to water your tree.

* Turkey fryers are very popular, but we've seen several accidents that resulted in fires and severe burns. Always use fryers in an open area away from walls, fences and structures that can burn. Use thoroughly thawed meats and raise and lower the food slowly to avoid spilling hot oil. Turn the fryer off immediately if it starts to smoke.

- * Use a good, solid ladder when hanging outdoor lights. Remember, frosty mornings make for slippery roofs. Pick a day when the sun is shining to climb up on your roof to decorate your house.
- Make sure all of your smoke alarms are in working order.
 Practice fire drills with your family.

Home Heating

Faced with mounting heating costs, many residents turn

to supplemental heating sources in the winter. Fireplaces, wood stoves and space heaters can help keep a room toasty, but they can also be a fire hazard if not used properly. Remember these tips:

- * When buying a new space heater, make sure it carries the mark of an independent testing laboratory and has a tip over safety switch.
- * Install fixed space heaters according to manufacturer's instructions or applicable codes or better yet, have it installed by a professional.

Assistant Chief Jake Doty to retire

n January, East Pierce Fire & Rescue Assistant Chief Jake Doty will retire after nearly 50 years of service as a volunteer and chief.

For nearly half a century, the citizens of South Prairie and beyond have depended on Doty to be there during an emergency. His towering frame has been a fixture at numerous fires and he has been a leader for hundreds of volunteer firefighters.

When Doty joined the South Prairie Volunteer Firefighters in 1962, firefighting was very different. Just getting to a fire was exciting. "If you made the fire truck, you stood on the tail board," he said. Volunteers who missed the truck followed in their personal vehicles. "If it was really cold, you made sure you didn't catch the truck." he laughed.

Born in Tacoma, Doty's family moved to South Prairie when he was a toddler

Doty followed his father, a South Prairie volunteer, into the fire service. Responding to fires on a 1927 Howard

Cooper, they didn't have firefighter gear or air packs. "We responded in our street clothes," Doty said.

In 1966, Doty married Sue. The couple raised three children. After 10 years as a chicken farmer, Doty started his own fabrication business, called "Jakes Welding".

In 1983, Doty was named South Prairie fire chief. He served until the fire District began the process of merging with East Pierce Fire & Rescue.

By then, times were changing. Citizens expected more of their firefighters, who were required to participate in more training than before. In addition to the fire calls, the firefighters provided emergency medical care.

"We went from 'come all, play all' to a professional, modern-day fire department," Doty said.

Under Doty's leadership as East Pierce assistant chief, the volunteers became a welltrained resource to the caree firefighters, providing essential back up during major incidents and playing an important role in the district's fire and life safety prevention efforts.

It's with mixed feelings that we at East Pierce say goodbye. For the many sacrifices he and his family have made in order to serve his community, Doty has earned his retirement. We thank him for his dedication and commitment and wish him many years of happy hunting.

Winter

* Plug your electric-powered space heater into an outlet with sufficient capacity and never into an extension cord.
* Use the proper grade of fuel for your liquid-fueled space heater, and never use gasoline in any heater not approved for gasoline use.
Refuel only in a well-ventilated area and when the equipment is cool

* Turn off space heaters when no one is in the room. Portable space heaters are so easy to knock over in the dark that they should be turned off when you go to bed.
* Do not use your oven to heat your home.

Sive space heaters space, at least three feet from things that can burn, including paper, bedding and people.

Severe Weather

Typically, winter brings severe weather. Around here that usually means flooding and high winds. Be prepared with these safety tips:
\$\preceq\$ Get a NOAA Weather Radio to monitor severe weather.

* Develop a plan for gathering your family together.
Have a child care plan if you are unable to reach your children at school or home.
* Keep your child's emergency release card up to date.
* Make arrangements with a person outside the immediate area for family members to contact in case you get separated.

* Without power, cash machines don't work and merchants cannot take credit cards. Keep enough cash to purchase food and fuel Cell phones may not work and cordless phones need power. Keep an old-fashioned plug-in-type phone at home. Without electricity, gas stations are closed. Whenever possible, keep the tank in vour vehicle at least half full so you have enough gas to get home during an emergency or evacuate to a safer area. * Take care of your neighbors. Citizens with special needs are particularly vulnerable during an emergency. The elderly, those confined to bed or a wheel chair and

electricity to operate may need extra assistance. * Never use a generator or barbeque grille indoors. They produce carbon monoxide gas that can be deadly if inhaled.

he Washington State Auditor's Office completed the annual financial and accountability audit for East Pierce Fire & Rescue, declaring no major findings or issues to address. "We have a long history of having very clear audits," East Pierce Fire Chief Jerry E. Thorson said. "We've never had a finding or management letter - that's

pretty good for a fire department."

The State Auditor's Office serves the citizens of Washington by promoting accountability, fiscal integrity and openness in state and local government. Working with the fire department, auditors help to ensure the efficient and effective use of public resources.

The auditors look at internal controls and department policies and procedures to make sure East Pierce personnel are adhering to legal bidding processes, providing prevailing wages and are in general compliance to all Washington State laws and regulations.

COMMISSIONER KUSS HONORED

Strategic planning process sets goals

ast fall, East Pierce began a strategic planning process that included personnel from throughout the organization, including the Edgewood and Milton fire departments.

"This is part of our effort to provide the best service possible with the most efficient use of the taxpaver's money. East Pierce Fire Chief Jerry E. Thorson said. "The process looks at every aspect of our organization from our level of service to our links with the community."

The Strategic Planning Team has been meeting regularly to address staffing, operations, training, infrastructure, leadership, health and wellness, fire prevention and public education. Among the goals are to improve service, develop future leaders, identify proper station locations and deployment and to establish effective communication both internally and with the public

Each year the Strategic Plan will be reviewed and extended for another year. "This will continue to be a living document helping to guide our organization," Thorson said.

Already several key opportunities have surfaced, including the need for a firefighter training center. Currently, there is no training ground for the East Pierce firefighters at any of the stations. "We practice firefighting skills in commercial parking lots. Unfortunately, it's not easy to provide personnel with critical hands-on training in fire behavior, hazmat mitigation, building collapse and rescue techniques," Thorson said.

The Team is also examining station locations to make sure they are properly placed for maximum coverage.

"Once the framework is in place, we will be asking for public input," Thorson said. "The final plan will determine priorities that will be crucial when developing annual budgets."

HEALTH Watch

Precautions to avoid the flu

Every year, the seasonal flu affects up to 20 percent of the U.S. population and kills an average of 36,000 Americans. This year, the combination of the seasonal flu and the H1N1 virus could mean even more Americans will be affected.

"H1N1 has certainly awakened Americans to the fact that flu is a serious health threat," East Pierce Assistant Chief Russ McCallion said.

Influenza (the flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. It's spread from person to person in respira-tory droplets produced every time the sick person coughs and sneezes.

Since symptoms begin to appear one to four days after the virus enters the body, you may infect someone else before you even know vou are sick.

"The best way to avoid infecting someone else is to get both the seasonal and H1N1 vaccines," McCallion said." It's especially important not to infect someone in your family who already has chronic health conditions such as asthma, heart disease, diabetes or an otherwise weakened immune system.

Protect yourself against the seasonal and H1N1 flu:

- Get vaccinated against seasonal influenza viruses.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, espe cially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective.

 Try to avoid close contact
- with sick people.

 Avoid touching your eyes, se or mouth.
- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze

If someone in your house hold is ill, you can prevent eone in your housethe spread of the virus by:

• Keeping surfaces (especially bedside tables, bath-room and kitchen surfaces) clean by wiping them down with household disinfectant.

- Eating utensils should be washed either in a dishwasher or by hand with
- water and soap. ■ Have the sick person stay in their room, rather than with the rest of the family.

If you have concerns about vaccines, McCallion suggests contacting a medi cal professional or going to a reputable Web site, such as www.flu.gov or www. tpchd.org for reliable scientific information about flu and H1N1 vaccines.

quickly when someone in our district is sick or injured.

In addition, Edgewood residents would receive a benefit offered to all residents in the East Pierce Fire & Rescue District - ambulance transport services with no out-ofpocket costs to the patient.

The merger would increase the number of firefighters on duty at the Edgewood station from 2-3 per shift to 4-5. "This allows for an additional crew to respond to more than one call at a time." Goodlet

If the Edgewood voters choose to merge with East Pierce, the board of fire commissioners for both districts would need to pass a resolution to authorize the merger. "If everything falls into place, it could be official as early as March Ist," Goodlet said.

In Milton, the City Council is evaluating a possible annexation, but there are some unique challenges to the proposal.

We must resolve the taxation issues before we can move forward," Milton Fire Chief James

Jaques said. Approximately 10 percent of city residents live in King County, while the rest reside in Pierce County. "Milton residents who live on the King County side pay both the King County EMS and the Milton EMS levies," Jaques explained. "This creates an unequal taxation issue that must be resolved before we can consider annexation."

Jaques points out that while fire districts can merge, city fire departments like Milton must be annexed.

"If all goes well, we could have a public vote in April," he said. "In the meantime, we struggle with the same issues facing Edgewood - too few firefighters to meet an everincreasing demand for emergency services.

To help address questions from the public, community forums have been scheduled for December 9 and January 13 at the Edgewood Fire Station, 10105 24th Street East. The forums will run from 7 to 9 p.m. For more information, call the Edgewood Station at (253) 927-2313.

VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTER BOB DIETRICH



Former East Pierce Volunteer Lieutenant Bob Dietrich died following a courageous battle with pancreatic cancer. He was 44.

Bob was born in Tacoma, the second of four children. He graduated from Sumner Senior High School in 1982 and in 1985, completed his degree at Green River Community College. In 1989, he married his sweetheart Becky

Conklin of Bonney Lake. Together they have two children, Meghan and Blake. Bob worked in the aerospace industry for

Hexcel in Kent and for over 20 years he was a volunteer firefighter for East Pierce Fire & Rescue.

Bob was an active sportsman, enjoying hunting and fishing. He was a dedicated father and active with his kids, coaching their fast pitch and baseball teams for several years.

Those at East Pierce wish to thank Bob for his selfless service to his community. He is missed.

Who is East Pierce Fire & Rescue?

East Pierce Fire and Rescue was created when the City of Bonney Lake Fire Department, Lake Tapps Fire and Pierce County Fire District 24 merged in 2000 with the goal of providing a seamless response to emergency situations.

In 2006, voters in Pierce County Fire District 12 and South Prairie Fire District 20 overwhelmingly passed a special election to merge th two districts with East Pierce.

Two years later, the citizens of the City of Sumner and Pierce County Fire District I also voted to join the East Pierce family.

Today, East Pierce serves a population of more than 75,000 living in and

around Bonney Lake, Sumner, Lake Tapps, the Ridge Communities, South Prairie, and Wilkeson. The district covers approximately 142 square miles and protects residents from eleven stations – five staffed and five volunteer and one station for the marine unit.

In August, 2009 officials from Pierce County Fire District 8 in Edgewood and the Milton Fire Department entered into an Administrative rvices Agreement as the first step towards merging with East Pierce Fire & Rescue.

All full-time firefighters are cross-trained as either emergency medical technicians (EMTs) or paramedics and are able to respond to both medical emergencies and fires.

An independently elected board of citizens governs the agency.
