FROM THE CHIEF JON PARKINSON

Tn April, East Pierce Fire & Rescue Lwill ask voters to consider a request to restore the fire levy to its original rate of \$1.50 per \$1000 of assessed value. The fire levy is the primary funding source for your fire district. It is critical to maintain current service levels and ensure we can continue

Proposition 1: Fire Levy

to meet the community's needs in the future. EPFR remains the most cost-effective fire district in Pierce County by having the lowest tax rate of any fire department.

Proposition 1 is **not a new tax**. Restoring this vital levy will ensure EPFR can:

- Improve your emergency response capabilities by ensuring funding for two additional response units to be put in service in 2024 and staffing two additional fire stations in 2024 and 2025.
- Continue strengthening our commitment to the community by ensuring your service levels keep pace with your current and growing
- Retain your dedicated firefighters, especially when a temporary federal

grant supporting 12 of them expires in 2026.

 Ensure stable funding to address the challenges of increasing expenses driven by inflation.

If rejected, your fire and emergency services face a projected revenue shortfall. This scenario could require us to either consider another attempt at voter approval for funding your fire levy increase or consider reductions in services and staffing.

A simple majority of yes votes is required to pass Proposition 1.

Dog Rescued from Frozen Lake Tapps Adopted

In January, East Pierce crews were Ldispatched to a service call for a dog on the ice on Lake Tapps during the record-low freezing temps.

Callers to 911 reported seeing the dog fall through the ice twice. The dog pulled itself out but would not come to shore when called. At one point, the pooch was about 400 feet from shore. Firefighters wore dry suits and creatively used ropes and bodyboards to reach the dog.

The female dog, a Shar-Pei mix breed, was not micro-chipped and looked about a year old. Metro Animal Services took her to their shelter in Puyallup. Despite trending social media posts and news stories, no one came to claim her.

HEALTH Nutrition for Firefighters A Vital Component of Occupational Health WATCH

arch is National Nutrition Month! LFor firefighters, maintaining good health is essential to ensure we are ready to perform and protect lives and property during demanding situations. Well-nourished firefighters experience increased energy and cognitive function,

Recognizing nutrition's critical role in your physical and mental well-being is important. We want to share good nutrition concepts and habits that East Pierce firefighters strive to make part of their daily routines.


 Muscle Repair and Recovery: Adequate protein intake is crucial for muscle repair and overall health. Include lean meats, poultry, fish, dairy, and plant-based protein sources in your meals. Muscle health precau-

tions are essential for firefighters as they engage in strenuous activities that lead to muscle damage.

- Hydration: Proper hydration is vital for maintaining body temperature, circulation, and cognitive function. Aim for regular water intake throughout the day. Hydration is a priority for firefighters working in extreme conditions that can lead to increased fluid loss through sweat.
- Micro-nutrients: Vitamins and minerals play essential roles in overall health. For example:
 - Vitamin C and Zinc: Support immune function and wound healing.
 - Iron: Vital for oxygen transport in the blood.

- Calcium: Important for bone health.
- Antioxidants: Colorful fruits and vegetables contain antioxidants that protect cells from oxidative damage. Include berries, spinach, kale, and bell peppers in your diet. Antioxidants are especially beneficial to firefighters exposed to smoke and other environmental toxins.
- Carbohydrates: These provide readily available energy. Opt for complex carbohydrates (whole grains, legumes, and vegetables) to sustain energy levels. Avoid excessive refined sugars, as they can lead to energy crashes.
- Healthy Fats: Omega-3 fatty acids in fish, nuts, and seeds support heart health and reduce inflammation. Incorporate sources like salmon, walnuts, and flaxseeds.
- Meal Timing: Irregular schedules can disrupt eating patterns. Plan and carry nutritious snacks to avoid relying on fast food during emergencies.
- Stress Management: High-stress situations can affect appetite and digestion. Practice stress-reducing techniques such as deep breathing, mindfulness, and adequate rest.
- Mindful Eating: Pay attention to hunger cues and eat slowly. Mindful eating helps prevent overindulgence.
- Consult a Registered Dietitian: They can create a customized nutrition plan based on your needs and goals.

Remember, nourishing our bodies with wholesome foods is an investment in our long-term health. Happy, and healthy, eating!

Smoke Alarms: A Sound You Can Live With

id you know that homes with working smoke alarms reduce the risk of fire fatalities by an astounding 50%?

East Pierce Fire & Rescue can provide our residents with free smoke alarms thanks to a partnership with the American Red Cross.



The smoke alarms, installed by EPFR firefighters, are equipped with long-life batteries which last approximately ten years.

"In the event of a fire, properly installed and maintained smoke alarms can save your life," says East Pierce Assistant Chief Matt Gilbert. "Smoke alarms provide early fire detection to allow your family time to escape safely." Install smoke alarms inside and outside all

sleeping areas and on every level of the home, including the basement. Since smoke and poisonous gases rise, installing smoke alarms on the ceiling is ideal and provides the earliest

"A working smoke alarm continuously scans the air for smoke, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. It never sleeps," says Gilbert. Hearing-impaired alarms (equipped with a lower-frequency tone and bed shaker component) are also available.

Test your smoke alarm once a month. Whether equipped with a standard or long-life battery or hardwired, all smoke alarms expire at ten years

ast Pierce Fire & Rescue invites all scouting groups up to fifth grade to attend the 8th Annual Scout Night from 6-7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 25th, at the Headquarters Station in Bonney Lake, 18421 Veterans Memorial Drive East.

The free event is geared toward groups within the fire district's service area, including Bonney Lake, Sumner, Lake Tapps, Milton, Edgewood, South Prairie, Tehaleh, and unincorporated Buckley.

Scouts rotate through various learning stations, including:

- Home Safety: Identify various home hazards, learn the importance of smoke alarms, and when to call 911.
- Basic First Aid: Learn first aid basics like cooling a burn and treating cuts, nose bleeds, and bee stings.
- Home Escape Planning: Design a home escape plan identifying two ways out of every room, designate a meeting place, and learn to crawl low under smoke.
- Emergency Preparedness: Learn why it's essential to have an emergency plan, how to assemble an emergency kit, and the importance of an out-ofarea contact.
- Firefighter and Law Enforcement Tools, Equipment, and Careers: Get an up-close look at the equipment firefighters and police officers use to stay safe and do their jobs and ask why they chose their careers.
- Ropes and Knots: Watch firefighters demonstrate various knot tying, then practice the skill.

BOND UPDATE: Making Progress

In November 2018, voters approved La bond to replace all six frontline fire engines and a ladder truck, replace four fire stations, and build a new fire station in Tehaleh.

Here is a brief snapshot of the status of these projects.

Fire Station Construction Status

► Station 118 - Edgewood: Opened in fall of 2023.

- ► Station 111 Bonney Lake: Under construction. Opens in summer of 2024.
- ► Station 114 Lake Tapps: Under construction. Opens in summer of 2024.
- ► Station 117 Tehaleh: Under construction. Opens early 2025.
- ► Station 112 Prairie Ridge: In

permitting. Construction to begin in summer of 2024.

► Ladder 113 and Engines 111, 112, 114, 116, 118, and 1119 are received and serving our communities.



WHO IS EAST PIERCE FIRE & RESCUE?

East Pierce Fire & Rescue was founded on a strong commitment to customer service. The district's Mission, Vision, and Values guide the department and its employees' actions. Exceptional customer service and concern for employees and their families have become hallmarks of our culture.

EPFR was formed when the City of Bonney Lake Fire Department, Pierce County Fire District 22/Lake Tapps Fire, and Pierce County Fire District 24 merged in 2000 to provide a seamless response to emergencies.

Since then, the following mergers or annexations into EPFR have occurred:

- 2006: Pierce County Fire District 12 and South Prairie/Fire District 20
- 2008: Sumner/Fire District 1
- 2010: Edgewood/Fire District 8
- 2013: Milton Fire Department

Today, East Pierce serves approximately 100,000+ residents living in and around Bonney Lake, Sumner, Lake Tapps, the Ridge Communities, South Prairie, Tehaleh, Edgewood, and Milton. The district covers approximately 153 square miles and protects residents from eight stations - seven staffed and one facility on Lake Tapps for the marine rescue unit

All full-time firefighters are cross-trained as either emergency medical technicians (EMTs) or paramedics and can respond to medical emergencies and fires.

An independently-elected Board of Commissioners governs the agency.

For years, adolescent babysitters have been "stepping in" for parents who young people bring a desire to care for children, few are prepared for the magnitude of responsibilities they assume.

are "stepping out." While many of these EPFR teaches the Safe Sitter curriculum to help equip students with life-long

skills and create future generations of safety-conscious adults and parents. Safe Sitter is a medically-accurate

program that teaches boys and girls in grades 6-8 how to handle emergencies when caring for children.

The three-day class includes safe and

nurturing childcare techniques, behavior management skills, and appropriate responses to medical emergencies, emphasizing child and infant CPR and choke saving. In addition to fire and injury prevention, it also teaches business skills for running a babysitting business.

Firefighters Provide Cozy Coats for Kids

In December, firefighters visited ten schools throughout the fire district to fit more than 200 children with a much needed new, cozy coat.

The East Pierce Firefighter's Local 3520 funds the cost of the coats through donations. The Local purchases the jackets from the Coats for Kids Foundation, a 501(c)(3) charitable organization established in Alexandria, VA in 2004. It is the distribution partner of Operation Warm,

"We often are asked if we accept coat donations for this event, however we cannot," says East Pierce Captain Troy Sterrenburg.
