## HEALTH Preventing Falls at Home WATCH A Key to Safety This Summer

Why is fall prevention such a priority for East Pierce Fire & Rescue?

Falls are one of the top reasons our crews respond to 9-1-1 calls—accounting for about 18% of EMS responses each year. While some occur outdoors, most happen at home—and most are preventable. For older adults, a fall can lead to hip fractures, long hospital stays, or loss of independence. Preventing just one fall can help avoid months of recovery or costly medical bills. According to the Washington State Department of Health, more than 1,100 deaths and 22,300 hospitalizations were attributed to unintentional falls among adults age 65+ in 2022. That same year, there were nearly 98,000 EMS responses related to falls across the state.

What are the most common causes of falls?

A Everyday hazards are often to blame. Slippery floors, poor lighting, cluttered walkways, or rushing to the bathroom at night can all increase the risk of falling. In fact, 78% of fall-related deaths are caused by slipping, tripping, or stumbling. Another common risk factor? Medications. Some can cause side effects like dizziness, tiredness, or slow reaction times. This is especially true for prescriptions that affect blood pressure, sleep, or mood.

What steps can I take to reduce my fall risk?

Small changes can have a big impact. The National Fire Protection Association recommends these eight easy, everyday steps to help reduce your risk of falling at home and staying steady on your feet:

- Exercise regularly. Look for strength and balance classes at local senior or community centers
- Take your time. Many falls happen when people are rushing, especially at night or early morning.
- **Keep walkways clear.** Pick up cords, clutter, and anything that could cause a trip.
- Improve lighting. Install nightlights or motion-activated lights in key areas.
- **Use nonslip mats.** Especially in kitchens, bathrooms, and entryways.
- Avoid loose rugs. Only use throw rugs with rubberized backing—or skip them altogether.
- Wear sturdy shoes. Avoid slippers or footwear that slides off easily.
- Review your medications. Some may have side effects that impact balance. Keep a list and talk to your doctor regularly.

Can EPFR help with fall prevention in the home?

Yes. East Pierce Fire & Rescue offers free home safety visits and fall prevention education through our Mobile Integrative Health Program. These visits include a walk-through to identify risks, suggest practical fixes, and connect you with helpful resources. Many updates are simple and affordable — like adding nightlights, railings, or supportive footwear. We're also a proud member of the Pierce County Fall Prevention Coalition, working to reduce injuries and support safe, independent living across our region.

### **Brush Trucks: Wildland Response Vehicles**

Not all fire engines stick to the pavement. When wildland fire season heats up—or storms hit hard-to-reach areas—EPFR counts on Brush 111 and Brush 116 to get the job done.

### What Is a Brush Truck?

Brush 111 and Brush 116 are East Pierce's goanywhere fire engines. These Type 6 wildland units are nearly identical — both built on Ford F-550 trucks by Cascade Fire Equipment in Yakima. Smaller and more agile than a regular fire engine, they're made for off-road use. With four-wheel drive, they can reach hillsides, trails, and storm-damaged areas where bigger trucks can't go. They're used year-round — from wildfires in the summer to snow and ice in the winter.

### **Equipment and Capabilities**

Each brush truck carries:

- A 400-gallon water tank
- A 10-gallon foam tank with injector
- One Stihl 500i chainsaw
- A weed eater with pole saw attachment
- Two portable water pumps
- A full set of wildland hand tools

These trucks are also designed for pump-androll tactics, which means crews can spray water while the vehicle is moving — an essential tool when fighting fast-moving grass and brush fires.

### When and Where They're Deployed

Brush units are primarily used during fire season (May 1 through October 31). However, they are also deployed year-round in response to storm damage, snow events, and off-road access needs.

While brush units have been used throughout the entire East Pierce district, our largest target hazards are above Wilkeson and out in Tehaleh.

They've also been deployed for:

- County-wide mutual aid
- State mobilizations across Washington
- Out-of-state responses, including Oregon and California

### **Staffing and Training**

East Pierce operates two brush units — one crew cab and one extended cab. The extended cab can carry up to four personnel. While all East Pierce firefighters are trained in basic operation of the unit, the department also has a dedicated wildland team of 21 members with advanced training in:

- Chainsaw operations
- Portable pump use
- Pump-and-roll tactics
- Use of firing devices

The units operate year-round, with dedicated staffing activated during heightened conditions.

### Other Uses and Operational Challenges

In addition to wildland response, brush units have been used to clear access during wind and ice storms and support search-and-rescue operations in remote areas.

Like all wildland deployments, these incidents come with their own set of challenges:

- Remote locations
- Limited water supply
- Steep and uneven terrain
- Long operational periods

Even with these demands, Brush 111 and Brush 116 remain a critical resource for fire suppression and all-hazard support — especially in places larger fire trucks simply can't go.



### FIREWORKS: Celebrate Safely This Fourth

The Fourth of July is a time to celebrate—but it's also one of the busiest nights of the year for fire crews. Every summer, fireworks cause injuries and fires in our community. A little extra care goes a long way in keeping your family safe.

"You can have fun, just be aware of the dangers and take proper precautions," says East Pierce Fire Marshal, Bill Sandlian.

In Washington, males 15-21 years of age are most often hurt by fireworks. Many injuries are serious, including burns and even amputations. Most happen when fireworks are held or lit too close. Even sparklers — often given to young children — burn at over 1,200°F, hot enough to cause serious injury.

Fires are also a big concern. Hot, dry weather and fireworks can lead to fast-moving grass and brush fires. Be smart about where you light fireworks, and make sure the type you use is safe and legal for your area.

#### Plan Ahead – Before You Light Fireworks

- Use only legal fireworks from licensed outlets.
- Keep fireworks away from children.
- Read and follow the label directions.
- Have a bucket of water or hose nearby.
- Skip fireworks if it's windy or dry.
- Keep pets safe and indoors.

### Use Caution – While Fireworks Are Active

- Only adults should light fireworks.
- Light one firework at a time, then step back.
- Never hold or relight a "dud."

- Never point or throw fireworks at people, pets, or buildings.
- Wear eye protection.
- Never use fireworks while drinking or under the influence.

#### Do Your Part - After the Show

- Soak used fireworks in water before throwing them away.
- Pick up all debris to protect pets and property.
- Keep lighters and matches away from kids.

If you're unsure about neighborhood rules, skip the guesswork and attend a local professional fireworks show instead. It's safer, easier, and still full of sparkle.

## **Grill Safety Tips for Summer**

Summer's a great time to fire up the barbecue—but it's also when grill-related fires spike. Whether you're using gas or charcoal, a few precautions can help you keep the good times going safely.

Here's what to keep in mind before your next cookout:


- Check your propane tank for leaks before using your gas grill. (The National Fire Protection Association has a helpful how-to video at nfpa.org.)
- Clean your grill regularly, including grease or fat buildup on the grates and in the tray below.
- **Set up safely.** Keep grills well away from your home, deck railings, eaves, and overhanging branches.
- Open the lid on gas grills before lighting them.
- Create a kid-and-pet-free zone, at least three feet away from the grill.
- Use charcoal starter fluid only (never gasoline or other flammable liquids), and never add fluid to an active fire.
- Let charcoal cool completely before disposing of coals in a metal container.
- Never leave your grill unattended.

Outdoor cooking should be fun and fire-safe. Stay alert, grill responsibly, and let's keep the flames where they belong—under the burgers.

### Who Is East Pierce FIRE & RESCUE?

East Pierce Fire & Rescue was founded on a strong commitment to customer service. The district's Vision, Mission, and Values guide the district and its employees' actions. Exceptional customer service and concern for employees and their families have become hallmarks of our culture.

EPFR was formed when the City of Bonney Lake Fire Department, Pierce County Fire District 22/Lake Tapps Fire, and Pierce County Fire District 24 merged in 2000 to provide a seamless response to emergencies.

Since then, the following mergers or annexations into EPFR have occurred:

- 2006: Pierce County Fire District 12 and South Prairie/ Fire District 20
- 2008: Sumner/Fire District 1
- 2010: Edgewood/Fire District 8
- · 2013: Milton Fire Department

Today, East Pierce serves approximately 100,000+ residents living in and around Bonney Lake, Sumner, Lake Tapps, the Ridge Communities, South Prairie, Tehaleh, Edgewood, and Milton. The district covers approximately 153 square miles and protects residents from eight stations - seven staffed and one facility on Lake Tapps for the marine rescue unit.

All full-time firefighters are crosstrained as either emergency medical technicians (EMTs) or paramedics and can respond to medical emergencies and fires.

An independently-elected Board of Commissioners governs the agency.

### **BOND UPDATE: Progress & Breaking Ground**

In November 2018, voters approved a bond to replace **▲**all six front-line fire engines and a ladder truck, replace four fire stations, and build a new fire station in Tehaleh.

Here is a brief snapshot of the status of these projects.

#### **Fire Station Construction Status**

- Station 118 Edgewood: Opened Fall 2023.
- Station 111 Bonney Lake: Opened February 2025.
- Station 114 Lake Tapps: Under construction. Expected to open June 2025.
- Station 117 Tehaleh: Under construction. Expected to open July 2025.
- Station 112 Prairie Ridge: Under construction. Scheduled to open Fall 2026.


